Did You Know?

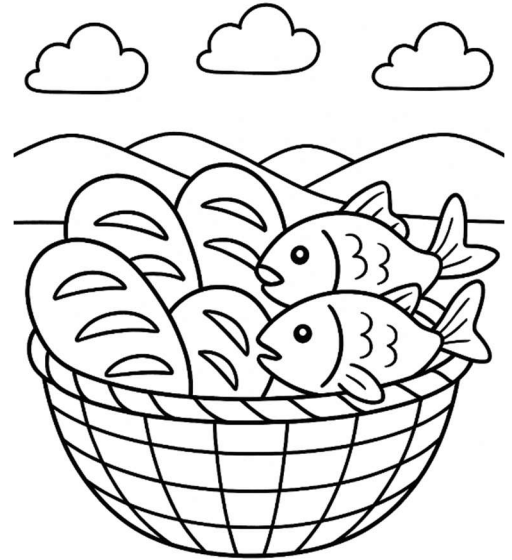
